adequate, there is enough of it or it is good enough to be used or accepted.

Admission

Is a statement acknowledging the truth of something (for example: *An admission of guilt*).

Adversity

Means misfortune, an unfavorable turn of events; a difficult or unlucky situation.

Afterwards

At a later or future time (for example: *He was arrested shortly afterwards*).

Aggregate

Is a whole formed by combining several elements. To aggregate is to add together.
