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CHRISTOFFEL NATIONAL PARK

Over thirty million years ago, an underwater volcanic eruption shifted the ocean shelf beneath Curaçao and created the higher altitude region currently known as Christoffel National Park. The climate is moister than it is in the lower-lying parts of the island, creating an environment where rare species of plants and flowers can thrive. In the beginning of May, visitors can catch the intensely yellow, trumpet-shaped flowers of the *Kibra Hacha* in bloom. "Kibra Hacha" means Axe-Breaker, a name earned because the wood of the tree is too strong to chop down.

On the Orchid Trail, one of eight designated hiking routes in Christoffel Park, visitors can encounter exotic cactus-blooming bromeliads, such as the *Barbo di Kodushi* and the *Teku di Polu*, and orchids, such as the white *Brassavola Nodosa* and the purple *Myrmecophila Humboldtia*. The rare Sambal Palm tree can be seen via a side trail to *Seru Blentu* (Windy Mountain).

And yet the undeniable star attraction of the park is Mt. Christoffel, the highest point of Curaçao at 375 meters above sea level. The strenuous, one-hour climb to the top should only be attempted in the morning, before the tropical heat becomes too punishing. Along the route, hikers will wander past lichens, bearded moss and iguanas. Few may also encounter rare wildlife such as the white-tailed deer, nectar-feeding bats and the Wara-wara eagle. The view from the peak, a sweeping panorama of the entire island, is simply breathtaking.

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MARSHE BARBER

On weekdays, Barber is a sleepy neighborhood with a quaint church and small general store. On Sundays, however, the village suddenly springs to life. Pick-up trucks roll into the parking lot of Marshe Barber in the morning, carting in crates of locally-grown mangoes, plantains and *pampuno* (Antillean pumpkin gourds). Little elderly ladies whip out their stew pots and begin stirring homemade *stobó*. Once the first scent of sizzling onions and tomatoes fills the air, the crowds begin to flock, powerless to resist. By mid-afternoon, Marshe Barber is a thriving hub of activity, a place where locals come to shop for farm-fresh produce, homemade baked goods and bright tropical plants to liven up their homes. Specialty vendors also sell teas, made from local herbs with purported healing properties, religious objects such as icons, beads and crucifix, and small local craft souvenirs.

Marshe Barber is more than just a farmer's market. Under the sheltered open-air pavilion, people also mingle with friendly neighbors and gather together in plastic chairs to enjoy authentic *knoyo* food at its finest, from *arepa pampuno* (pumpkin pastries) to cups of *sopi piské* (fish soup). The *kos dushi* (literally: "sweet things") can be enjoyed for dessert. Or take home a package of *kuki di letter*, letter cookies which are wrapped and tied with a ribbon, as a thoughtful gift.

The Sunday market is busy, but never crowded. It is not a major tourist attraction, so brush up on your *Papiamentu* before attending.
